



# Can the Thai energy storage industrial plant be built





## Overview

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Although private power producers generate more than half of Thailand's electricity, the wholesale market and grid operations are dominated by three state-owned utilities. As such, government procurement plays a key role in the deployment of new infrastructure. Thailand's grid remains heavily.

The energy and electricity sector in Thailand is governed by the Ministry of Energy (MOE) and involves multiple agencies: the Department of Alternative Energy Development and Efficiency (DEDE), Department of Energy Business, Energy Policy and Planning Office (EPPO), the Department of Mineral Fuels.

Thailand intends to source nearly 35,000 MW of new electricity from renewables as it looks to reach carbon neutrality and net zero commitments. However, the deployment of Battery Energy Storage Systems across the country remains limited. There are plans to increase storage capacity, but it may not.

To mitigate the impact of intermittent wind and solar power generation, the Electricity Generating Authority of Thailand (EGAT) plans to invest 90 billion Thai baht (approximately 2.6 billion USD) in expanding pumped-storage hydropower plants at three dams. These plants will use pumped storage.

The Provincial Electricity Authority (PEA) of Thailand will explore the feasibility of energy storage business models in collaboration with Nuovo Plus, a subsidiary of state-owned oil and gas company PTT Group. PEA, responsible for electricity provision in 74 provinces, excluding urban centers like.

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Are there grid-scale energy storage projects in Thailand?

There are currently few grid-scale energy storage projects in Thailand, although the situation is likely to change. In furtherance of its commitments under the Paris Agreement, the Thai government has enacted policies which envisage renewable energy accounting for the majority of grid capacity and output by 2040.

How many mw can a solar generator store in Thailand?

Their total combined storage capacity was 994 MW. Interestingly, this allowed generators to sign semi-firm power purchase agreements (PPAs) with the Electricity Generating Authority of Thailand (EGAT) with minimum availability guarantees. Many solar projects in Thailand have non-firm PPAs in place due to a lack of storage on site.

Does Thailand need a battery energy storage system?

Thailand may lack the Battery Energy Storage Systems (BESS) necessary to navigate supply and demand challenges. The 2024 PDP draft included 10,000 MW of BESS, but this may see the country struggle to fulfil carbon neutrality and Net Zero commitments over the coming decades.
